Global Canvas 2019: A Success Story

In an effort to raise awareness on the vulnerability of dugongs, a marine species whose habitat is polluted by human activities, students from the GEMS American Academy in Abu Dhabi created an art display featuring a dugong exposed to pieces that threaten its existence.

The display was submitted for the Global Canvas -Children's Art Competition organized by the David Wildlife Foundation, wildlife Shepherd а conservation charity. The theme for this year's art competition was "Habitats of the World".

Students from GEMS American Academy decided to focus on dugongs, seeing that the UAE is home to the second largest population of dugongs in the world. Due to the defenseless nature of dugongs, they are protected by Federal Law No. 23 and 24. The Environmental Agency Abu Dhabi banned fishing by nets in Abu Dhabi to conserve marine animals, as these nets pose extreme dangers to dugongs.



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Zayed Sustainability Prize

H.H. Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan announced in 2008 the commence what was formerly known as the Zayed Future Energy Prize, now known as the Zayed Sustainability Prize.

Since then, the award has been commenced annually to commemorate the sustainable legacy of the late Sheikh Zayed. Over the past decade, the award has garnered much recognition and now proudly represents Sheikh Zayed's vision to an ever-growing number of people and organizations all over the globe.

As of 2018, the award encourages participants to present innovative sustainability ideas and solutions over a wide scope of fields, as opposed to previously mainly to renewable energy fields. This came with the name change, as sustainability issues are more complex and cannot be addressed within energy fields alone.

As entries are only accepted till June, the SSI team is encouraging its students and schools to consider participating in this competition. This will help them build a network with all kinds of people in the sustainability field as well as gain insight into current issues and solutions. Additionally, winners receive an award alongside funds to further their ideas and proposals within their given field.

The SDGs are strategies tailored to end poverty and other deprivations through improving economy, healthcare and education while also protecting natural resources from depletion. The strategies also tackle climate change and land protection.

The SDG Help Desk is a one-stop online platform that serves as a gateway to a wide range of knowledge and analytical products, including SDG data portals, toolboxes, e-learning courses, multimedia resources, technical advice and opportunities for peer-learning and South-South cooperation.

This portal was chosen to be one of the resources for this issue as it gives students and interested parties the opportunity to learn and expand their knowledge about a wide variety of things, engage in online forums, or collect information for research purposes.

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Proposed Field trips

Masdar and Shams Power Company

With one of the highest per capita greenhouse gas emissions, Abu Dhabi has set out on a two-decade diversification plan to include renewable energy sources to meet its energy needs. One of the first steps towards achieving this goal is building the Shams I power plant.

Located in the western region of the Abu Dhabi Emirate, 120 km southwest of Abu Dhabi, Shams I is considered one of the biggest plants in the world and evidently the first of its kind in the Middle East region. The plant is set to produce 100MW of electricity from solar energy annually, reducing CO2 emissions by 175,000 ton every year, which is the equivalent of planting 1.5 million trees.

Schools are encouraged to take their students to these renewable energy plants, as they are set to be deployed as the main energy sources to supply the country with. Students can experience first-hand how these plants operate.

The bus tour will give students information on the mechanism of operation of the plant. Walking tours are conducted for small groups. Visits to schools in the vicinity by the plant officials can also be arranged.

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Beeah UAE, Sharjah & Center of waste management. Abu Dhabi

A second field trip location can be to a waste management or a recycling facility. Considering the theme of the trip and the type of locations, this trip is best suited for high school students. Students are generally aware of how to manage their waste, but this trip takes a step further to show what happens to the waste they segregated in a recycling center. Teachers can then link what they learned from the trip to science subjects as well as business subjects.

Students in Abu Dhabi can head out to the Center of Waste Management in Abu Dhabi. A visit to this center will show students how the city authorities deal with the waste generated in the city.

If you are interested in visiting any of the recycling facilities in Abu Dhabi, contact the Center for Waste Management, Abu Dhabi.

Students in Sharjah or nearby emirates could head out to Bee'ah UAE in Sharjah .Bee'ah has several recycling facilities, from material recovery facilities to medical waste recycling facilities. Schools can even get their waste recycled through their Tandeef Office and School Recycling Facility.
